



This project was part of a larger blueprint of campus rationalisation which included moving a large part of the School of Education to the Mawson Lakes Campus of the University of South Australia. The Garth Boomer Building accommodates the administration and staff offices plus those teaching areas which cannot be accommodated in generic university and tutorial spaces. The building has two wings. One wing houses laboratories, workshops and specialist teaching spaces connected with the School of Education. It maintains the form and scale of the existing buildings facing the main east-west axis of the campus through the alignment and design of the two storey Teaching Wing. To the south of this wing, a courtyard and bridge link connect student learning spaces with a four storey Academic Wing, incorporating faculty and administrative offices, meeting spaces, postgraduate workspaces and a staff common room. The central courtyard is enlivened by the inclusion of a glazed student centre which opens out to paved and tree shaded spaces. The building forms a transition between the university campus and the mixed use zone shared between the University and the emerging Mawson Lakes Town Centre.
